Masks for Essential Workers

The Family Learning Center has been closed this spring, not holding classes or programs in person. But workers in the refugee community have continued to work in essential industries, like health care and food production. Outbreaks in care homes for the elderly, and at the Tyson plant in Wallula threatened these workers and their families. Some people were sick with COVID-19, and needed help navigating healthcare and the process to get unemployment and sick pay. Others were concerned about protecting vulnerable people who lived in their homes.

The Family Learning Center worked with groups like Friends of Tyson Workers to advocate for the safety of workers at Tyson. Home-made cloth masks were donated for us to distribute to our families. We also created simple English information sheets based on information from the Benton-Franklin Health District and the state health department. The BFHD also helped us find some information in languages our friends could understand.

We distributed over 600 masks, along with hand sanitizer, soap, and good information, to families connected with the Family Learning Center.

Please pray for these families who do this important work. Pray for their safety and health, and that they will be given the respect and help they need, both to stay safe, and to care for themselves and their families if they become ill.

Closed for COVID but not shut down

When schools closed in March, so did our English classes at the Family Learning Center. We don't think any of the 45 students or 18 volunteers who were part of our program expected that we wouldn't return this year.

But thanks to caring volunteer teachers, we haven't stopped serving refugee families. Initially, some teachers reached out to students with notes, phone calls, or text messages. We made contacts with parents who attend our Ready! for Kindergarten classes.

Many of our families had workers in essential jobs, and were exposed to COVID-19. Some teachers were among our mask-makers, others helped make contacts and delivered masks and information.

As we learned to connect with people while being physically distant, we began to look for ways to help our students continue to learn English.

Four volunteer teachers, Lois Douglass, Suzanne Benfield, Brenda Draper, and Tanya Lasuk, met with our level 4 students via Zoom. Only a handful of students were able to connect that way, but they met faithfully with Suzanne and Lois until early June. Brenda and Tanya have reached out to other students to work one-on-one with them.

We don't know exactly what fall will bring. We hope for in-person classes, but might need to find other ways to help refugees and immigrants learn English. What won't change is the need for welcoming friendships and opportunities to learn. We hope you'll join us, as a supporter or volunteer!
